As a new month begins, we are still celebrating Easter waiting more. Don't ding to see if the "Stay at Home" Policy will be relaxed or extended. So, to the hatred that I want to share with all of you my Easter Homily. If I were to give it resides a title, I would call it, "Easter is here to stay!"
