Listening, Being With and Witnessing to Youth . . .

St. Leo's Youth Ministry program under the direction of Judie Kuhlman meets youth where they are and invites them to stretch and grow in their faith and deepen their relationship with God.

For the pre-school and primary children weekly Children's Liturgy of the Word introduces children to the Sunday gospel and reinforces its theme with prayer, song, and crafts to help them remember what they learned.

Middle and high school groups help youth understand more about their faith and deal with issues of their daily lives from a faith perspective.

Recent youth group activities included a discussion about social media, a deeper explanation of the Eucharist, the meaning and practice of chastity, as well as respect for the elderly, visiting residents at Mercy West Park Nursing home with youth from St. Leo's partner parish Our Lady of Visitation. Youth also had an opportunity to discuss and paint their dreams for the future with Art for All People ministry.

St. Leo candidates took part in a Confirmation retreat at St. Maximilian Kolbe parish. Some of the high school boys participated in the two day Our Lady of Visitation retreat and all teens are encouraged to take part in St. Leo youth group retreat March 29 and 30.

As reflected by these programs youth ministry requires a holistic approach. As Pope Francis describes it, "Much more than the promotion of a series of activities *for* young people, this ministry consists in walking *with* them, accompanying them personally in the complex and at times difficult contexts in which they are immersed. Youth ministry is called to gather the questions of young people of today and, from them, to initiate a true and honest dialogue to bring Christ into their lives."

Pastor's Ponderings . . .

With the mark of an ashen cross and the words, "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel," the holy season of Lent begins, Wednesday, March 6, 2019.

There is a story of a little boy who was waiting for his mother to come out of the grocery store. As he waited, he was approached by a man who asked, "Son can you tell me where the Post Office is?" The little boy replied, "Sure just go straight down this street a couple of blocks and turn to your right." The man thanked the boy kindly and said, "I am the new pastor in town. I'd like for you to come to church on Sunday. I'll show you how to get to heaven." The little boy replied with a chuckle, "Awww, come on... You don't even know the way to the Post Office."

Lent is a time for finding the way to heaven that the Lord has made for us. We renew and recommit to this way by turning away from the sin in our lives and adhering more faithfully to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is a time to walk the spiritual journey through this world to the next one seriously. It is a time for recommitting and committing more deeply to the life of our baptism and for acknowledging Jesus as our only way to heaven and to salvation. It is a time to prepare others for the Sacrament of Baptism and for walking closely together on the trail of salvation.

This year, we have a total of 33 adults and children who are preparing to receive the Sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation sometime during the Easter season. We will be joining with all the parishes in the Cathedral Deanery to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation with Bishop Binzer at the cathedral. "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." (Joshua 24:15) We will take our Lenten journey together as we allow Jesus to be our way, truth and life to the Father. We pray with them and support them as they prepare to receive these Sacraments and as all of us learn to live with God's presence of grace.

Lent is a time to admit that we don't always know the way, on our own and we turn to Jesus to show us the way. It is a time to admit that we often get sidetracked or tempted into detours and so we seek the Lord's forgiveness and mercy and begin walking a straighter path with the Lord as our guide. It is a time through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to enter deeply into the paschal mystery of dying to self so that others may truly live. It is a time to acknowledge that dying leads to eternal life because the Lord suffered and died for us so that we might share with him the joy and glory of an everlasting kingdom. It is a time to feast on the mercy of God as food and nourishment for the sacrifice of self and the carrying of the cross that is of utmost importance as we learn to walk in the footsteps of Christ to a life where pain and suffering are no longer.



So, what do we want to do, as individuals and as a parish for Lent in the ways of prayer, fasting and almsgiving? Remember, whatever we decide to do, it should be leading us in the way of heaven and witness to others that all of us are heaven bound. It's time for all of us to grab our walking sticks, put on our hiking boots, take the Lord's hand and

keep walking with our eyes fixed on heaven, joyful that our lives are full of grace. Happy Lent, Everyone!

It's Grace . . .

When I was working in a chemical dependency treatment center years ago a young man shared his shame at never measuring up to what he believed his father expected of him. "If I could only please him," he said, "then he would love me." I asked if he believed that on the day he was born his dad cradled him in his arms and said, "Son, if you do.....then I'll love you?" The young man recognized the absurdity of my question and nodded as I said, "Love is a gift. It can't be earned."

One of my favorite spiritual authors, Brennan Manning captured this in his final book, "All Is Grace" which chronicles his descents into alcoholism, his failures as a priest, and follower of Jesus. In both his successes and lapses, he recognized that God loved him as he was and that love enabled him to change and love in return.

Despite all the times in Scripture that Jesus and the prophets tell us that love is freely given and that it's not about what we do we still have a tendency to want to perform so that God will find us pleasing and love us.. We know in our spirits that this is a lie but our minds have a lot of catching up to do. This is especially true for some of us during Lent when we tend to multiply our prayers and sacrifices. If these are combined with change of heart and growing awareness of God's abundant love for us they are beneficial, but externals alone do little.

I challenge you to sit for a moment with Hosea 6:6: *For I desire mercy, not sacrifice, and acknowledgment of God rather than burnt offerings.* Uncomfortable isn't it for those doers among us (myself included)? It seems too simple and paradoxically, that's why it is so hard.

The goal of this focused time of Lenten awareness, it seems to me, is to more deeply awaken us to God's love for us and to let this love overflow in the way we love others. As the first letter of John reminds us, *"We have come to know and have believed the love which God has for us. God is love, and the one who abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him. We love, because He first loved us (1 John 4:16, 19)*

God continues to invite us into an ever deepening relationship. "Come back to me with all your heart. Don't let fear keep us apart...Long have I waited for your coming home to me and

living deeply our new love"—these are the words of one of my favorite Lenten songs. And I believe that is how God interacts with us.

"For I know well the plans I have in mind for you--plans for your welfare and not for woe, so as to give you a future of hope. When you call me, and come and pray to me, I will listen to you. When you look for me, you will find me." (Jeremiah 29:11-13)

God is a persistent lover who keeps luring us into deeper and deeper relationship .And this allure continues every day of our lives.

My one grandson was explaining that he loved me" so much" (arms outstretched) but "I'll love you more when I get older." His twin brother told his mom recently that he'd have to have "arms as long as Professor Gadget's" to wrap around his mother to show her how much he loves her. Even at the age of 5 they seem to understand that love continues to deepen and grow as long as we live.

Relationships with grandchildren, family, and friends take time to nurture. I think it's the same with God. Jesus gives us tips on how to do this: *"But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen... And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of their many words. ...When you fast, do not look somber as the*

hypocrites do, for they disfigure their faces to show others they are fasting." (Matthew 6:6, 16)

The main thing we have to do is show up—it's as simple as that—no spiritual boot camp—just the desire to be there. God does the rest. It's love gift from God to us. St. Paul reminds us: *"For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, so that no one may boast..."* (Ephesians 2: 9, 10)

God's love is gift—pure grace. There is no possible way we can earn it. So this Lent let's allow God to do the work. What we do might look the same, but I'm guessing that we'll experience a new freedom and peace and intimacy\ in the process. And we just might experience God cradling us like jubilant new parents and whispering, "I love you. I'm so in love with you."
