My Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Lord,

Today is the Third Sunday of Advent as we celebrate Gaudete Sunday, a Latin word translated in English to mean *Rejoice*. And so today, we boldly embrace our joyfulness as we await the good news of Jesus' birth in two weeks' time, on Christmas Day. On Gaudete Sunday we light a pink candle and place it within our Advent wreath, and we notice the color of our celebrant's vestments in a rosy hue, both to highlight the joy that is about to enter all our lives. There is nothing on earth that can compete with the arrival of Jesus Christ, Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. Yes, we can experience happiness on earth, but our true joy resides in our Savior. Author Samuel Dickey Gordon makes an important distinction between earthly happiness and joy, of which he says joy "is distinctly a Christian word and a Christian thing. It is the reverse of happiness. Happiness is the result of what happens of an agreeable sort. Joy has its springs deep down inside. And that spring never runs dry, no matter what happens. Only Jesus gives that joy. He had joy, singing its music within, even under the shadow of the cross." And our joy is manifested today in the Lord's incarnation and his return at the end of time.

In our Gospel today, we also reflect upon prophet John the Baptist, who remains an important figure in the Advent story. Dressed in sack cloth, he literally and symbolically cries out in the wilderness that the Messiah is at hand. Yet, when John is imprisoned by Herod, he asks his followers to pose to Jesus this question: "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" There are differing opinions as to why a true believer John the Baptist would be the one to ask such a question. Was it because he was experiencing doubt as he suffered in prison, or was he artfully reinforcing Jesus' role as the Messiah, to those who might later question his authenticity? However one interprets it, John's direct question has great relevance for us today, as we measure the strength of our own faith against troubled times, personal struggles, or complete suffering without relief in sight. It's difficult to reconcile our thoughts, our faith, with a loving Father, amid all the suffering we see in this world. God asks us to trust Him, believe in Him, love Him, and realize it's all in His loving hands.

Saint John Bosco perhaps said it best: "God will provide."
