# November 27,2022 My Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Lord,

Hope... The dictionary definition is "to cherish a desire with anticipation: to want something to happen or be true," and in this first week of Advent, as we await the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, our hearts are filled with the joys of what is to come. It is the time of beginnings, as we look forward to a new liturgical year and turn the page onto the season we love to celebrate—Christmas Day and the birth of the Christ Child. However, we must prepare our hearts and our lives to receive such a wondrous gift, so let us begin to think about what we must do to be truly ready.

In his apostolic letter for the celebration year of the new millennium, St. Pope John II, declared a central theme, restated from Hebrews 13:8: Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. These same words appeared as the Vatican's official logo for the jubilee year, and they are especially poignant when we consider our own relationship with Christ in terms of this Advent season. Matthew's gospel today, interestingly, reflects not on Christ's birth but upon his second coming. Jesus asks us to be *prepared*, *stay awake*, and realize there will be no advance warning when He comes again. Time is irrelevant; faith is the only constant.

Yet, human beings seem to love to organize themselves around time periods and calendar events: years, months, seasons, holidays, and many other representations of beginnings and endings. Yet Jesus Christ is continuous throughout time, and our readiness to see Him again should be steadfast, true, and something time can never exhaust. We should always be ready and looking forward to our ultimate home with the Lord.

As we begin this first week in Advent and start our preparations for the Christmas season, let us focus on how we can faithfully accomplish what Jesus is asking us to do in this Gospel. As you scurry around in preparation for the secular doings of Christmas, such as buying gifts and attending get togethers, could you also make haste in preparing yourself for the promise of Christ and the extraordinary presence of God in your life? Just begin... The most important thing is this: Jesus will come again to earth in a most glorious, triumphant and final sense, and we must prepare to meet Him.

The exhortation to be watchful resounds many times in the liturgy, especially in Advent, a season of preparation not only for Christmas, but also for Christ's definitive and glorious coming at the end of time. It therefore has a distinctly eschatological meaning and invites the believer to spend every day and every moment in the presence of the One 'who is and who was and who is come' (Revelation 1:4), to whom the future of the world and of man belongs. This is Christian hope!" —Saint Pope John Paul II
